

South Carolina Courts


> South Carolina continues to have:

- * More than twice the national average of filings per judge




Funding Sources in 2000 Compared to This Year

2012 – 2013 SCJD Budget Requests






E-Courts / E-Filing Update

- SCJD received \$5M to begin development of E-Filing
- The first step for E-Filing was development and implementation of the Attorney Information System (AIS)
- AIS is now the source for attorney contact information for the courts and SC Bar
- E-mail is now the primary means for court notifications as hardcopy mailings are being phased out
- When completed, E-filing will provide a funding source for SCJD technology that eventually will be able to replace the current federal funding source







Statewide Court CMS for Circuit and Magistrate Courts

> On June 20, 2011, the final county went live with the statewide Court CMS; therefore,100% of the total criminal and civil state caseload is now processed by the statewide Court CMS

Many current manual functions will be automated and many new capabilities will be available

- Scanning of court documents when they are received
- Electronic notices via email
- Electronic opinion circulation
- Proactive case monitoring
- Public access





Docket Management Task Force

- Purpose was to review court operations, consistency and effectiveness to maximize the use of court resources
- Reports from each of the three subcommittees (General Sessions, Common Pleas and Family Courts) are being finalized into a consolidated report

Primary recommendations include:

- Additional judges and staff
- Statewide court management including:
 - Fast track jury trial program
 - Adherence to differentiated case management
 - Use of backup case docketing
 - Mandatory mediation
 - Allotment of greater time and processing for complex cases versus less time and processing for simpler cases












Newberry County Self-Help Center

- Goal of this program is to provide legal information and resources to people who cannot afford an attorney
- Since July 2011 when the center opened and began providing office hours one day per month:
 - Over 50 clients served
 - 98% lacked attorney representation
 - A majority of these clients had household incomes less than \$21,500
